

Book Review

Hinds Feet on High Places by Hannah Gurnard (read by David Symington)

Whilst having lunch at John and Liz's house a few months ago, I happened to mention to Liz my great passion for the biblical book, The Song of Solomon. Upon hearing this, Liz promptly produced from her shelf the book Hinds Feet On High Places and declared that I must then read this. "It's great", she promised. "You'll love it!"

I read a lot of books each year, almost all quite intense and to the point, so as I began to read the first chapter, I was instantly worried because this was a very different genre. The principal character, a crippled young woman called Much Afraid, lives in a mountain valley called the Valley of Fear. Her home is surrounded by various family members with the equally not so subtle names of Pride, Bitterness and Self Pity etc. These overbearing relatives are determined to pressurise poor Much Afraid into marrying her ugly, brutish cousin, Craven Fear. The one saving feature of her life though is the occasional visit of the Chief Shepherd who, when he is present down in the valley, makes her life bearable for a few short moments, before he leaves again to return to the far-off mountains, the high places.

By the end of chapter one my initial worry had now turned to annoyance. Ahead of me it seemed were days of dragging myself through a clumsy 21st century knock-off of an all-time classic, Pilgrim's Progress. However, I had promised Liz I would read it and read it I would. I didn't know then how wrong my first impressions were; this book would be timely and change my life.

I will give you a brief synopsis of the story. The Chief Shepherd bids Much Afraid to leave her family and the Valley of Fear and head towards the mysterious mountainous high places where he himself lives. Much Afraid does, but is shocked to find that instead of the Chief Shepherd being her mountain guide, he assigns her two aloof strangers instead. This unlikely female trio comprises of a crippled young woman who can barely walk, and two silent strangers, called Sorrow and Suffering. They go on a long journey, often not able to see the way ahead; at other times they even seem to be heading in the wrong direction. Through seemingly constant trial and hardship, with few moments of rest and peace along the way, Much Afraid reaches her destination. She learns to walk in the previously unimaginable high places and, her feet slowly having been healed along the arduous journey, Much Afraid also learns to overcome regular attacks from her Fearing family who seek to try to lure her back to the Valley of Fear.

The book is punctuated with unforgettable lessons seamlessly woven into the story, such as:

"When you wear the weed of impatience in your heart instead of the flower Acceptance-with-Joy, you will always find your enemies get an advantage over you."

"She had the feeling that somehow, in the very far-off places, perhaps even in far-off ages, there would be a meaning found to all sorrow and an answer too fair and wonderful to be as yet understood."

"I must warn you that I see your enemies lurking among the trees ahead, and if you ever let Craven Fear begin painting a picture on the screen of your imagination, you will walk with fear and trembling and agony, where no fear is."

Book Review (contd.)

The moment a person commits their life to Jesus is incredibly precious, but we forget that it is but the start of the journey into being transformed into the image of Christ. The emotional baggage we had before we made that commitment to Christ is still there the day after. Learnt behaviours, emotional trauma, disappointments. The Holy Spirit finds us in a 'messed up' state to begin with. Oh how we wish the journey from cripple to crown was one of only smiles, laughter and good times. Realistically the road ahead will be dotted with suffering and sorrow, yet through these hardships we are changed for the better and made increasingly ready for heaven. We are more useful in our service to God. Sadly there is no other way.

I had known this truth before, but somehow this book shed a new light on this truth. This helped me better digest its reality. Many parts of the book I pondered for a long time after. A couple of weeks after returning the book I found myself stricken in bed with COVID, fighting fears of what the future had in store for me. The words of this book came as a great comfort to me then, as I was unable to read or listen to anything at that time. I had to rely on what was already fresh in my mind and in my heart. I am very glad it was the words from this book.

I would highly recommend this book. Male or female, young or old, this is a book you will read again and again every few years. It blessed me beyond words and I know it would bless you too.





KIWOKO HOSPITAL

Kiwoko Hospital

Kiwoko Hospital is a community based hospital in rural Uganda. Born in 1987, it has grown to become an extensive modern hospital serving the rural community.

The Hospital has a specifically Christian ethos and outlook, summed up in the motto of the hospital "We treat... Jesus heals". Hospital staff meet in the mornings to worship and pray together. They understand that people need to experience healing in all areas of life, physical, emotional, social, and spiritual and seek to be channels of God's grace to this end.

Prior to returning to Bangor nearly 5 years ago Rory was the Medical Director at Kiwoko Hospital. He still (Covid permitting) visits regularly. We are exploring developing a partnership between Christ Church Primacy and the hospital to see how we can learn from and bless each other.
